FROM THE CHAIRMAN

IT HAS BEEN WELL DOCUMENTED THAT THE PAST 12 MONTHS HAS BEEN CHALLENGING FOR CRICKET TASMANIA. OUR MEN'S TEAMS DID NOT PERFORM AS WE WOULD HAVE LIKED OR TO THE POTENTIAL WE KNOW THEY HAVE. IT IS OFTEN SAID THAT TASMANIA PUNCHES WELL ABOVE ITS WEIGHT IN CRICKET.

This is true to an extent – because of our size and population we are restricted in the local playing pool and in the amount of income that we can generate, as opposed to the other larger States. However, we remain the one and only Tasmanian professional sporting organisation with four national teams and we will be judged on that basis, not against the likes of the Northern Territory or the ACT but against full strength New South Wales and Victoria. We are not only expected to challenge them; we are expected to beat them. This is the sporting world that we live in and it isn't going to change. We cannot play the little guy or spend our time reminiscing about past glories.

It became clear in early 2017 that as an organisation Cricket Tasmania needed to ensure that we had the structures and formats in place so that our players and coaches progressed to the best of their ability and fulfilled their potential. We needed to have the vision to do this because the last season told us that the Tasmanian public bleeds for our cricket teams and expects them to be of high quality.

As a result, there was a substantial changeover of personnel. Following David Johnston standing down Cricket Tasmania was fortunate to recruit the current New South Wales Sports Administrator of the Year, Nick Cummins, as the new CEO. Nick brings an enthusiastic and dynamic approach to our organisation and has already made his mark. The Board engaged Michael Hussey to undertake an independent review of Cricket Tasmania's structures, pathway programs and high performance programs. Following that review Drew Ginn was employed as High Performance Manager and Ben Rohrer as Talent Manager. In addition, we welcomed new Head Coach Adam Griffith for the Tasmanian Tigers and Gary Kirsten for the Hobart Hurricanes.

Jeff Vaughan has been employed as Tasmanian Tigers' Assistant Coach.

The Board was not going to sit on its hands and go through another couple of seasons like the last two. These changes have been made, we believe the organisation will be stronger because of these changes, and we look forward to the upcoming season. What the Hussey Report told us firmly was that we needed to have the best people in the right positions.

However, too much time can be spent on what is only one aspect of the overall performance of Cricket Tasmania. It should not detract from everything else that goes on, and every year there are numerous highlights. This year was no exception.

Five members of our State Senior Men's Squad – George Bailey, Ben Dunk, James Faulkner, Tim Paine and Jackson Bird represented Australia in all formats of the game. That equates to about 25% of the squad. Jake Doran, Cameron Boyce and Mac Wright were selected in the Australian National Performance Squad.

Georgia Redmayne had a bumper season for the Roar and was rewarded with selection in the Australian Shooting Stars Team, where she dominated against Sri Lanka and put herself well on the way to selection for the Australian Senior Women's Team.

Our umpiring stocks continue to blossom with Sam Nogajski and Mike Graham-Smith being selected on the International Panel.

In November 2016 Blundstone Arena hosted the Second Test between Australia and South Africa. This was the first time we have hosted South Africa and our first Test involving a top three opponent. The result was certainly a memorable one for Australian cricket history for all the wrong reasons and led to substantial change in the Australian team selection panel and playing personnel.



We cannot manufacture the weather or the result, but what should not be overlooked was that the ground was turned out like a picture and the pitch and facilities were rated as first-class by the ICC Match Referee. Credit should go to our curating and venue management staff not just for this game but for the way the venue has been turned out over the past 12 months.

In May 2017 Blundstone Arena hosted the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) meeting of the Prime Minister, Premiers of the States and First Ministers of the Territories. Again, the venue drew high praise from those who attended, especially the Western Australian Premier (who failed to mention that Cricket Tasmania has spent over \$20 million of its own funds developing the ground, none of which was provided through GST!).

The Big Bash League goes from strength to strength and the past season saw record crowds with over 70,000 people attending the four matches at Blundstone Arena. That was only about 1,000 short of a complete sell out for all games. Around 1 million people watched each Hurricanes men's game on television including the second most watched game for the tournament, where Ben McDermott's amazing century saw the Hurricanes win on the very last ball after a record run chase. The reach of the Hurricanes is not just in attendance or on domestic television, the team has a huge following on the sub-continent and that can only be good for Tasmania tourism.

The coming season will see the Hurricanes journey to Launceston for the first time to play a men's game. This has been the culmination of over four years of planning and hard work. The WBBL Hurricanes have played there successfully for a few seasons. It is important that the Hurricanes are not just a Hobart team but a team for all Tasmanians. This will lead to increased sponsorship and membership, which will not only help Cricket Tasmania's bottom line but the profile of the Hurricanes. It will also hopefully see an increase in government funding. We have a national local high profile team playing at the highest professional level and in that regard it is often

disappointing to see substantial funds being spent on attracting fly in/fly out interstate teams of other codes.

The Tasmanian Roar had a much-improved season with several individual firsts. The Roar are still a developing team but each year improvement is seen. The WBBL Hurricanes again performed excellently reaching the semi-finals. Julia Price does a fantastic job overseeing the State and Hurricanes female programs. In the past two years, the WBBL Hurricanes have fallen at the semi-final stage but do not seem to be far away from overall success. Our Men's Futures League team went through the season undefeated with many young players pushing claims for senior selection and the future looks bright.

The game in Tasmania continues to expand at a rapid rate and this year over 43,003 people of all ages participated. This is a record and shows ongoing substantial growth in line with Cricket Australia's overall strategy. Congratulations should go to our Game and Market Development General Manager Ben Smith for overseeing and ensuring this continued growth. The Hussey Report has told us that more needs to be spent in developing this base through high performance programs throughout the state. Processes are in place to ensure that the recommendations made by Mr Hussey are implemented together with looking to improve facilities for players state-wide.

Of course the last 12 months have also seen losses. I want to pay tribute to the former coach of the Tasmanian Tigers Dan Marsh, and the former coach of the Hurricanes Damien Wright. Both are long term servants and icons of Tasmanian cricket and their passion and love for the game, Tasmania and Tasmanian cricket has never been doubted. It is never easy to make these types of decisions and as I said at the time these were the hardest decisions made in my 14 years on the Board. We thank them both for their efforts. Long term player, coach and Cricket Manager Andrew Dykes also left the organisation. Andrew was also a passionate and long term servant of Cricket Tasmania and we thank him for his efforts.

Xavier Doherty also announced his retirement. Xavier progressed from George Town Cricket Club to not only represent Tasmania but Australia with distinction in all three formats of the game. Julie Hunter also retired after a wonderful career and providing great service in her final playing years in our female program. We thank Xavier and Julie for all their efforts and wish them well in the future.

David Johnston stood down after over 19 years as Chief Executive. David's achievements during his tenure are vast, including the major developments of 2003, installation of electronic score boards and video screens, obtaining approvals for and installing the lights at the ground, the second major development of the ground in 2014, becoming the first major cricket venue in Australia to have a naming rights sponsor, LED signage, digital sight screens, the creation of the men's and women's Hurricanes sides in the BBL and the re-development of the women's side and attracting and continuing AFL Football. Importantly, David has also had the interest of the members at heart and has left an outstanding legacy. We thank David for his time as Chief Executive.

Finally, I would like to thank our hard-working Cricket Tasmania Board, especially Deputy Chairman Paul Green, for their efforts over the past 12 months. The work of the Board is often a thankless one, no one gets paid for being on the Board and difficult decisions affecting livelihoods are often made. I want to thank our management team, in particular Steve McMullen and David Paynter for their efforts, and Cricket Australia Director Tony Harrison.

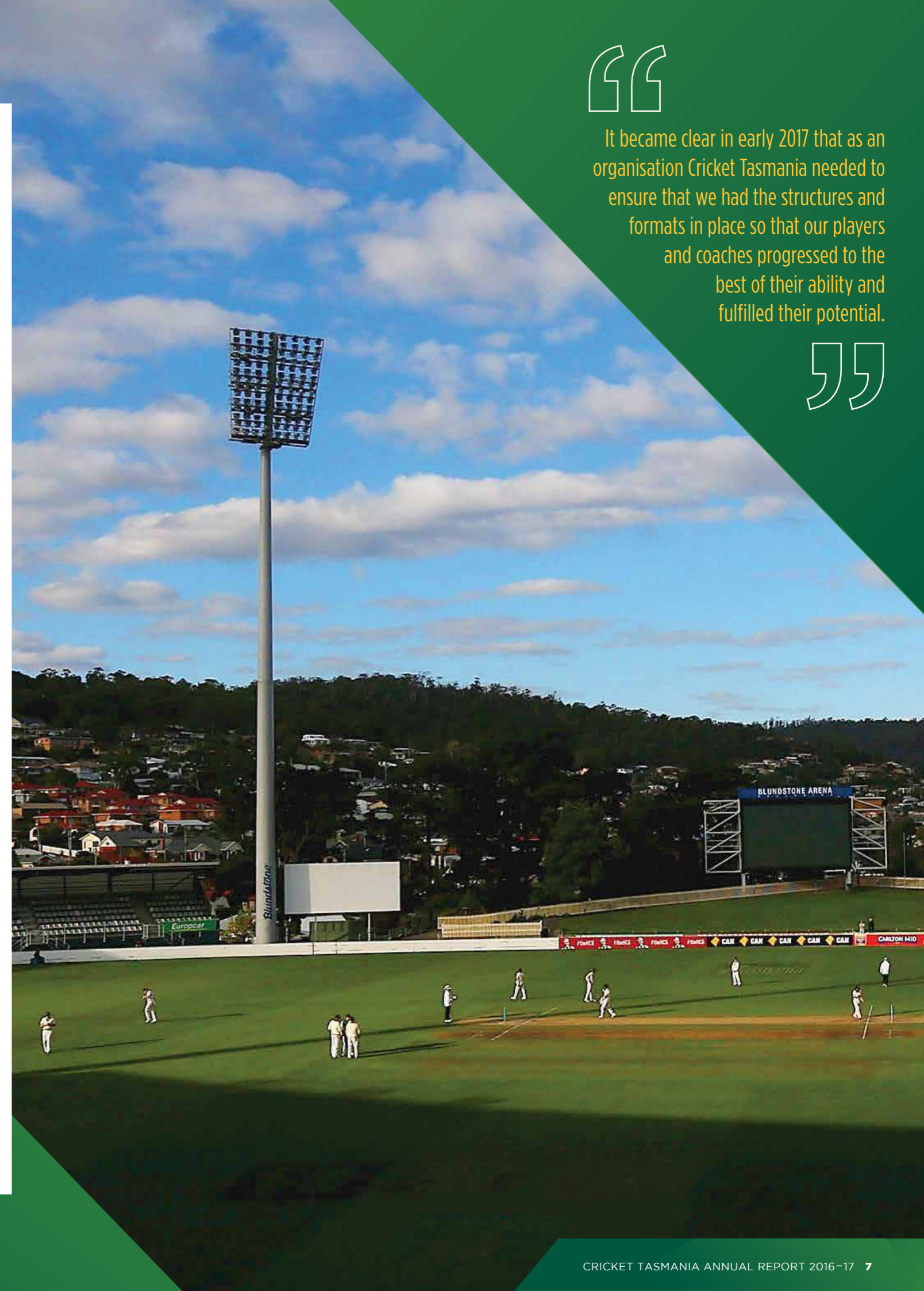

FROM THE CEO

AS THE NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF CRICKET TASMANIA I'D LIKE TO CONGRATULATE MY PREDECESSOR, DAVID JOHNSTON, ON HIS STELLAR 19 YEAR CAREER AT THE HELM OF THE CRICKET ASSOCIATION.

When I think about how much transformation he has overseen during his time, I am both thankful for the path he has blazed and a little daunted by the prospect of filling such big shoes.

It's an honour to have the opportunity to lead Tasmanian cricket.

I'm excited by this responsibility. Although we have negotiated a tough few years on the field, the opportunities clearly outnumber the challenges.

And for me, the steps to success are clear; professionalise, commercialise and perform.

To professionalise (and that's not to say the current staff aren't professional!) means to deliver a clear vision, underpinned by strong values and absolute role clarity.

I want to set standards for our staff - no different to the standards we expect from our players. If we expect our players to be the best at what they do in the country we should expect the same of our staff from the receptionist, to our Head Curator, to the CEO.

So what does that mean? It means working for Cricket Tasmania is the same as playing for Tasmania. It's a privilege not a right - there are no jobs for life. Stay if you are contributing at the right level. There is an elite standard and the rules apply to everyone, including me.

It does take time to create a high performing team, but I saw it at the Sydney Thunder where we went from the lowest of lows to the highest of highs. Ultimately, the way to achieve this is through fantastic people who possess a great desire to succeed.

The second step is to commercialise. There is a lot of untapped potential in Tasmanian cricket and the more revenue we can drive for the sport the more we can then feed back into grass roots across the state.

I want to see the Hurricanes, Tigers and the Roar be regarded as Tasmania's

pre-eminent teams - the teams for all Tasmanians.

As the only professional sports teams in this state, we need to be leaders in the community both on and off the field. It's our responsibility to present cricket as the sport of choice for males and females and continue to lead from the front.

It's clear to me that the future financial strength of Cricket Tasmania will come from the inexorable growth of the Big Bash - a format of cricket that has engaged a new generation of fans and challenged every major sport in Australia to think about how they engage with their fans into the future.

We've got a stake in this exciting League in the form of the Hurricanes and I want to see us eclipse Hawthorn and North Melbourne in terms of membership. I find it incongruous that fly-in/fly-out AFL teams have 10,000 and 7,000 Tasmanian members respectively, yet our state's team - the Hobart Hurricanes - has only 3,000. My ambition is to ensure the Hurricanes have the most members of any team that plays in Tasmania, and by a significant margin.

We need to put the accelerator on the growth of women's cricket. Australian cricket has had national women's cricket formats since the 1930s and while other sports have started to catch up, cricket needs to continue to drive growth and that means professionalising the women's game sooner rather than later.

Cricket presents the only opportunity for talented females to play professional team sport and reside in this state. We must get behind this and encourage more girls to be involved with cricket across Tasmania. It is the sport for all.

We need to energise the sport in the North and North West. Tasmanian cricket can only thrive if we have all regions behind us. I'm excited about our landmark announcement to



play our first BBL game for points in Launceston this summer. This will give another 20,000 fans from the region access to a visible pathway that will hopefully inspire the next generation of children to pick up a bat or ball.

The final step is performance. While I can't guarantee wins, I'd like to be able to guarantee a high performance culture and high performing teams.

What does high performing mean and how do we assess ourselves? It's simplistic to assess Cricket Tasmania's success by the number of Tigers' wins, our program has much more depth than that.

Of course we want success on the field, but I also want to see Tasmanian boys and girls being selected for Australian representative teams in the pathway. I want to see a Roar or WBBL Hurricanes player make her debut for Australia. I want to see players from our Men's program pushing for selection to wear the Baggy Green. I want to see the men return to the BBL finals and the women maintain their position as a perennial WBBL title contender.

Most of all, I want our cricket program to be seen as a destination. I want us to have the reputation that any player who participates in our cricket program will become a better player,

leading to higher honours. With Head Coaches Adam Griffith, Julia Price and Gary Kirsten at the helm, I believe we can fulfil this aspiration.

I've been involved in cricket in one shape or another since I was seven-years-old. I played 26 years at a remarkably low level at a club where my Dad was president. This has given me a strong appreciation of the work of volunteers and what it means to drive community cricket.

I am conscious that club cricket is the life-blood of our game and my desire to ensure Tasmanian cricket thrives at the elite level should result in better competitions, better facilities and a healthier cricket community at the grassroots.

As I begin my tenure, I look forward to the challenges ahead and having the chance to work with the many passionate and dedicated cricket volunteers that make this game great along the way.

A MESSAGE FROM DAVID JOHNSTON

AS I REFLECT ON MY TIME AT THE TASMANIAN CRICKET ASSOCIATION/ CRICKET TASMANIA I LOOK BACK ON THE WONDERFUL TIMES AND ACHIEVEMENTS THAT HAVE OCCURRED WITH A GREAT DEAL OF PRIDE AND SATISFACTION AND GRATITUDE TO ALL INVOLVED.

The organisation is certainly different from when I began, when there were 21 staff and a turnover of \$1.8M to now we have more than 70 full time staff, around 45 contracted players and a turnover of around \$22M.

During my tenure with Cricket Tasmania I have been associated with 33 different Directors, 4 Chairmen (Denis Rogers, Brent Palfreyman, Tony Harrison and Andrew Gaggin) over 190 different staff members and numerous male and female players. It has been a pleasure to work with all these people as they have a passion for Tasmanian cricket and in whatever their area of expertise they have endeavoured to advance the game in our state in a committed, enthusiastic and diligent manner.

Our major strategic focus is around providing players to our national teams. Through our development programs, high performance pathways and our coaching structures we have been successful in this endeavour. The delight that these players bring to our Tasmanian community when gaining national recognition is significant and demonstrates to junior players that they can represent Australia while playing and residing in Tasmania.

Since I began with Cricket Tasmania we have won three Sheffield Shield finals and three Domestic One-Day finals, but also reached three other Shield, two One-Day and two Twenty20 finals making a total of 13 finals appearances at an average of 1 final every one and a half years. Obviously, the highlight of those finals was winning the Pura Cup/ Sheffield Shield Final in 2006-2007. We had been performing consistently and competitively up until then but this emotional victory made the rest of Australian cricket take notice of Tasmania and the recognition of our players at national level increased significantly.

The development of the Bellerive facility has also been a major focus in my time with Cricket Tasmania.

The improvement in infrastructure and facilities for players of all codes, general public, corporate guests, media, Cricket Tasmania members and our staff has been significant and was essential to keep pace with other venues and to attract major sports to the ground and corporate functions.

The first re-development completed in late 2002 included the construction of the David Boon Stand, the Members' Pavilion, including new corporate facilities, offices, the museum and a new indoor centre. This took the capacity of the ground to around 16,500. We then saw the installation of a players' gymnasium and the erection of arena lighting which enabled us to expand to host night games. During this time, we also expanded the restriction on the ground so we could host events other than sport at the venue. This was significant because it has enabled us to develop our events and conference business which opens the venue to a greater range of clientele.

Along the way we have installed video replay and scoreboard screens, both temporary and permanent and resurfaced the whole ground including the cricket pitches.

We then negotiated the relocation of the Clarence District Cricket Club to Kangaroo Bay so that we could proceed with the redevelopment of the western side of the ground. This included the new Ricky Ponting Stand which housed new player and umpire dressing rooms, a new indoor centre, seven corporate boxes, extensive function area, administration offices, the Plumb Cafe and additional undercover seating for Cricket Tasmania members. This latest venture has increased the ground capacity to around 19,000 and greatly improved the public and private facilities during major matches.

The recognition of the history of Tasmanian cricket has also expanded with the development of the ground.



The addition of the Field of Fame, statues of David Boon and Ricky Ponting, the opening of the museum, awarding life memberships, the many paintings and photos displayed around the venue and the naming of awards has fittingly acknowledged our pre and post Sheffield Shield cricketers, administrators and notable cricket identities.

The gaining of a naming rights sponsor of the ground, in Blundstone, on a long-term agreement has been significant and a valuable partnership for the Association.

Other events and accomplishments that have impacted the Association are:

- The thrill of hosting international cricket at the venue. The successful management of these games brings credit to the state and a major focus from around the world on Tasmania. The continued attraction of these matches is important for the state and Association but will remain a challenge with the international schedule facing greater pressure.

- The continued association with all levels and persuasions of government to improve the infrastructure at Blundstone Arena and cricket facilities around the state. As well as the assisting with the positive promotion of cricket from junior level to the elite with community programs to supporting events has been vital.

- » The attraction of AFL matches to the venue.
- » The move to player contracts that have enabled men and now women to spend more time on honing their skills and becoming better players.
- » The launch and success of the Hobart Hurricanes, both men's and women's teams that have broadened the supporter base and fan demographic of our sport.
- » The growth in participation of cricket in this state to more than 43,003 people, and the growth in girls and women's cricket in the last few years.
- » The hosting of the Cricket World Cup in 2015 and the resultant \$35M economic influx into Tasmania.

- » The expansion of Cricket Tasmania membership from 600 to over 2,300 members including associate members. The increase in facilities for members, the benefits and services and the different events and further recognition of members has been noteworthy.
- » The introduction of Cricket Tasmania values, our Strategic Plan and the advancement of our culture.

The Association is in a strong position which will enable it to continue to be a leader in sport in this state. I hear the phrase 'punching above our weight' used frequently but do not subscribe to this view. We are in national competitions for women and men across all ages, and success in these will be how we are judged and not our size or resources that we have to select from. We should continue to use these aspects as positives to drive innovation and success.

When appointed 19.5 years ago, the Board were looking for stability which I have provided over my journey. I feel that I could do this without falling back into situations of stagnation that can occur during long term tenures. Hopefully I have contributed to the growth and success of our sport and I leave the Association in a better overall position but in a different state than when I began.

The progress of cricket in Tasmania has never been due to one individual but a collection of entities. To that end I thank all levels of government, the Tasmanian cricket fraternity, Cricket Tasmania members, all our sponsors over the years, Cricket Australia and other State Associations for their support and the Cricket Tasmania Board, staff and players for their dedication, passion and commitment.

I finish with some sadness but great expectations for Tasmanian cricket and will continue to support our teams and have a strong interest in all things relating to cricket in Tasmanian.

XAVIER DOHERTY



ONE OF TASMANIA'S MOST RESPECTED AND HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL CRICKETERS ANNOUNCED HIS RETIREMENT IN MARCH, WITH 34-YEAR-OLD SPINNER XAVIER DOHERTY IMMEDIATELY RETIRING FROM FIRST-CLASS AND ONE-DAY CRICKET AFTER WHAT HAS BEEN AN OUTSTANDING CAREER SPANNING 15 SEASONS.

"X" or "Dohy" as he's known, was discovered in George Town in the north of the state before he debuted for the Tigers at the age of 19 in 2001-02. He then went on to represent Tasmania and Australia with much success, his best figures in the shorter form being 4/18 against Victoria in Hobart in the one day final in 2008 and 4/28 against Sri Lanka in 2011.

On debut for his country in 2010 he made impact early with four wickets against Sri Lanka at the MCG. Crowned the Ricky Ponting Medallist in 2019-10 as the best Tasmanian cricketer for that season, he has also been a part of winning three One Day titles for the Tigers and was also part of the Sheffield Shield win at Blundstone Arena in 2010-11.

"I have absolutely loved being a Tasmanian cricketer and I sometimes have to pinch myself when I think about the opportunities

and highlights I have had throughout my career. I feel very grateful to have been part of such a successful, exciting and important era for Tasmanian cricket and I hope to be able to continue to watch more success in the future.

"Receiving my cap for Tasmania as a 19-year-old was pretty special and to go on to be called up for Australia in 2010 and claim that Baggy Green was a surreal feeling. Both those moments were amazing, however it was celebrating the wins and each other's success with my teammates that I will treasure the most.

"I would like to thank my wife Emma, daughters Scarlett and Eloise, the rest of my amazing extended family, my teammates past and present and the rest of the Cricket Tasmania family who have supported me unconditionally on this journey."

JULIE HUNTER



JULIE HUNTER RETIRED FROM ONE DAY CRICKET IN OCTOBER BUT AT THE CONCLUSION OF THE WBBL SEASON CLOSED THE CURTAINS ON HER STELLAR CAREER.

A former Australian representative, Hunter moved to Tasmania from Victoria in 2015-16 having played with the Vic Spirit from 2003/04. She played a crucial part with the WBBL Hobart Hurricanes in the WBBL for the past two seasons, helping them make back to back semi-final appearances.

Hunter played 32 T20 Internationals for the Southern Stars, making her debut in February 2010 against New Zealand. She was part of the Southern Stars '3-peat' - winning the World T20 in 2010, 2012 and 2014. In the 2012 World T20 she took her best bowling figures in T20 cricket taking 5-22 vs West Indies in the semi-final.

Hunter has a long list of achievements in the One Day game also, having played 93 matches in the WNCL, 84 for Victoria and 9 for Tasmania. She made her Southern Stars debut in 2010 and played 23 One Day Internationals for Australia.

Hunter believed it was the right time to end her career.

"It's been amazing playing with this group of girls for the past couple of years and I'll walk away with a purple heart.

"Both Tasmanian teams are headed in a great direction and I'm proud to have been part of that.

"I love the game and still get that nagging thought of "just one more?" But I've reached the point where I can't give it everything, so for me I can no longer give enough to keep going.

"A teammate just reminded me what a huge career it's been and I'm certainly proud of what I have achieved and had the privilege to be a part of - I'll take those moments and the friendships with me."

'A future cricket star in the making'

Overall, we hosted the Test Match of Australia versus South Africa, five Sheffield Shield matches, four BBL matches, five WBBL games, two WNCL matches, seven club cricket finals, three NMFC AFL matches, a state match, eight CDFC State League matches and a Clarence City Council World Games Day.

Added to the on-field events we had over 200 functions within our buildings of various types from weddings, meetings expos and even COAG.

In general, events at the venue have run very smoothly for the year and credit should go to my hard-working staff. The venue is now seen as one of Australia's leading operational venues which is something that all stakeholders can be proud of.

Special mention should go to our Head Curator, Marcus Pamplin, and his curating team. Whilst the results on the field haven't been exactly what we are looking for as an organisation, the pitch and outfield ranked number 2 in the country for Sheffield Shield and number 1 in the country for BBL. The AFL have also made comment on how well the venue transformed from cricket to football (in no less than 12 days) and GWS recently suggested that it is one of the best surfaces that they have played on.

Our Test Match was an operational success. The ICC Match Referee, Andy Pyecroft, commented at the conclusion of the match that in his mind it was the perfect Test wicket, a bit in it early, ability to bat well through the middle and starting to break up late. As all would be aware we had a rained-out day and two Australian batting collapses which affected the match itself. Andy was full of praise for our preparations, venue and facilities and promised to take the message back to the ICC.

The BBL season was a fantastic result with three of our four home matches selling out. Operationally all things went well and the big crowds got in and out of the venue without too many delays. We implemented a new bus transport system

for the series which has now been taken up by NMFC for their AFL games.

With current world incidents, and with the venue now hosting significant events in keeping with safety requirements, we have developed a Security Master Plan for the venue. We have also spent time workshopping this document with Tasmania Police, Clarence City Council and our security provider. Members can be assured that as a facility we have strong measures in place to ensure patron safety.

The future for the venue continues to look bright in 2017-18. The JLT One-Day Cup returns which gives us elite content earlier than usual. We have no Test Match next season but we have a T20 International after the BBL. We will continue to work with the AFL to try to secure a fourth game in the season. The NRL have an interest in playing in Tasmania and we will continue to be at the table to discuss this.

The operations of the Museum came to Venue Operations in 2017-18 and we will look to implement new tours and strategies to ensure that this important part of the business stays at the forefront of our minds.

Business in the function area continues to grow and has become an important source of income. During 2016-17 the operations for this have transferred to Venue Operations and we will continue to execute a high standard of functions. Plumb Café's popularity continues to grow and there are exciting plans for this coming into summer.

GROUND REPORT

MARCUS PAMPLIN HEAD CURATOR

INTERNATIONALS

This season Blundstone Arena hosted South Africa, one of the best Test nations in the world. There were high expectations pre-game that it would be a terrific contest that would attract a large crowd. Unfortunately, the weather Gods didn't do the venue any favours and we experienced overcast and wet conditions throughout the match. There was a whole day lost due to rain, which badly affected the attendance of patrons. The match turned out to be a disappointing result for Australia as it highlighted our inability to cope with the swinging ball in cloudy conditions, which has also been our Achilles heel in England. Australia were totally outplayed by an outstanding bowling attack. South Africa also batted stoically and Quinton De Kock showed his class with an effortless century.

The Test Match has been pivotal for Australian cricket as major changes to the team and the selection process were implemented. The feedback from the ICC and the media was outstanding, reporting that it was what a Test pitch should be, a contest between bat and ball.

SHEFFIELD SHIELD

The pitches for the Sheffield Shield and Roar were consistently very good throughout the season. The pace and bounce provided a contest between bat and ball, which was highlighted by good batting and bowling performances. As a result, the pitches and outfield were given excellent feedback throughout the year.

BBL AND WBBL

The BBL and WBBL schedule was very condensed again, which saw great results for the women but not so for the men. The players enjoyed great conditions. Blundstone Arena was voted the number one venue for the pitch and outfield across all venues in the BBL competition. This was a terrific accolade for the curating team during the Christmas, New Year period when there is a lot of weekend work and late nights.

PRACTICE PITCHES

The practice pitches again were given a very heavy schedule, with several areas being renovated and seeded during the

season after use and reused to cope with the high demand. The reconstructed pitches on Church St were not online until late November as the soil was still settling and compacting. This area improved as the season progressed and they were given very good feedback towards the end of the March.

To alleviate the high use and the reduced pitches due to the reconstructed area on Church Street, all teams from juniors to senior men and women's teams had over eight weeks of centre wicket practice. This wasn't ideal for pitch preparation for games, but it did relieve the pressure on other practice pitches. We will endeavour to provide centre wicket practice pitches for the senior teams again this season if the schedule allows.

AFL

The ground again is holding up well to the rigours of the football season. With very high use for training and early morning games on match days the oval is providing a safe and excellent surface. North Melbourne and other teams have all provided excellent feedback about the playing surface.

STAFF

The venue no longer has any apprentices, as Luke Graham and James Di Saia have both completed their qualifications. As well as gaining their qualifications, Luke and James have prepared terrific practice and centre pitches at Blundstone area. James Di Saia was also nominated for the Apprentice of the Year and attended the AGCSA National Turf Conference in June.

The high use of the practice pitches by all teams from under 13s to seniors, both men and women placed extra pressure on the facility and especially on the Derwent Street practice pitches where Oliver Beswick did a great job producing very good pitches in trying conditions.

Unfortunately, late in the season, Anthony Kennedy left to take up a position as a supervisor at Casey Fields in his native Victoria. Anthony was integral part of the curating team for over eight years. As well as producing quality pitches on the main wicket and practice area, he was a great support to me and a valued member of our curating team and Cricket Tasmania and we wish him all the best.

TEST MATCH CRICKET IN TASSIE

Tasmania's cricket leaders fought hard for a Test match and it was crucial the fans proved they wanted it with Members and fans turning up to support the blockbuster Test between Australia and South Africa. While the match didn't go to plan for Australia, and the weather meant a day's play was lost, the local, national and international media all had plenty of down time which meant extra promotion of some of our local players who took the time to take part in interviews on radio, TV and chats with print journalists.

HURRICANES BBL AND WBBL HYPE

The exposure and opportunities in the WBBL have already changed the landscape of women's sport. The television audiences in particular show that when women's cricket is available to watch, there is an appetite for it. With some exciting internationals and some talented Tasmanian players in both teams, the excitement throughout Tasmania during the Big Bash continued this season. However, it was the WBBL matches and double headers that proved fans were loving both the men's and the women's competition more than ever, supporting their club by attending Blundstone Arena and UTAS Stadium in Launceston. The "purple haze" that spreads across the city through public appearances, and the huge media coverage during the Big Bash season, has seen the Hurricanes continue to be Tasmania's favourite club. The signing of English superstar Stuart Broad along with crowd favourites such as Bailey and Paine, the excitement of winning the "un-winnable" and Ben McDermott's rise to fame at Ethiad Stadium as well as a semi-final for the women saw cricket dominate sport news throughout the Tasmanian media.

CRICKET TASMANIA CELEBRATES 10 YEARS SINCE FIRST-EVER SHIELD WIN

While the 2016-17 season didn't go as planned for the Tigers, there was reason to celebrate a decade on from the moment when Tassie cricket climbed Australian cricket's Everest, finally winning the Sheffield Shield title after years of trying. The historic win at Blundstone Arena (Bellerive Oval at the time) deserved a re-run and while the Season Launch and Ricky Ponting Medal ensured that moment was replayed and those involved honoured. The local media recognised its place in Tasmanian sporting history by covering it extensively throughout the season, interviewing key players from the 2006-07 final against New South Wales, re-living the moment through images and audio and celebrating Tasmanian cricketing history with pride.

2016/17 SEASON MEMBERSHIP

THERE WERE 1673 CRICKET TASMANIA MEMBERS DURING THE 2016-17 SEASON, ALONG WITH 588 ASSOCIATE CARDS.

The main drawcard this season was the Commonwealth Bank Test Match between Australia and South Africa in November 2016. Despite the weather and an average match in terms of performance, it was great to have a Test back at the Arena for the second consecutive year. All Members and Associate Card Holders had guaranteed access along with the ability for members to purchase one guest pass for days one and two and two passes for days three and four. Day one was the most popular with 1100 members and guests in attendance. With no play on Day 2 the Test match saw a last-minute decision to welcome back a Curator's Breakfast, which had guest speakers in former Australian Captain Kim Hughes and Blundstone Arena Head Curator Marcus Pamplin. Overall we had 34 members and guests attend the breakfast. 2200 Members and guests attended the Members' Pavilion across the four days of play. Support needs to be continually be shown by all members and fans to be a candidate for international cricket in the future.

There were seven Hurricanes matches including two double headers with the BBL & WBBL Hobart Hurricanes both in action. Members were once again able to purchase two guest passes per match, with a total of 300 passes available each BBL match. Guest passes were extremely popular with all matches selling out days in advance. A total of 5123 members and guests were present across all BBL matches and double headers, with the match on the 8th January drawing the largest member crowd of 1349.

Members were once again privy to three AFL games at Blundstone Arena this year, with North Melbourne taking on GWS, Adelaide and Melbourne. Despite match times not being ideal, there were still uptakes of over 1,000 tickets for all three matches sold in the Members' areas and a total of 473 Platinum Members who had the ability to claim complimentary tickets.

The 2016-17 season saw the organisation celebrate an inaugural achievement, with two members celebrating 60 years of membership with Cricket Tasmania/Tasmanian Cricket Association. Don Mills and Peter Murfett both joined the program in 1956 and were recognised at both the Members' 30-year Luncheon and also the Ricky Ponting Medal for their significant achievement. We also celebrated 20 new additions into the 30-year recognition club and one member for 40 years of membership.

The Hobart Hurricanes achieved their greatest number of members during BBL|06 & WBBL|02 season, with 3,162 members, which was a 17.63% increase on the previous year. The past season included introducing a new category of membership called the 'Century Club' with 70 members upgrading or joining into that class. The Century Club was set up to offer a more exclusive feel, with limited numbers, private bar and a prestigious atmosphere situated in the Century Room in the Members' pavilion.

This year promises to be another strong year for Cricket Tasmania across our all Membership programs. Cricket Tasmania Members will again enjoy access to all cricket at Blundstone Arena, with the addition of our first BBL expansion match played in Launceston.

IT WAS A DISAPPOINTING SEASON OVERALL FOR THE TASMANIAN TIGERS THROUGHOUT 2016-17, HOWEVER THERE WERE SOME POSITIVE SIGNS SHOWN IN INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES IN BOTH FORMATS OF THE GAME, PROVIDING A SHINING LIGHT AMONGST A SEASON TO FORGET. THE TIGERS FINISHED THE SHEFFIELD SHIELD SEASON IN LAST POSITION, AND WHILST THE START WAS STRONG ON THE ONE-DAY FORMAT THE TEAM FAILED TO MAKE THE FINALS OF THE MATADOR ONE-DAY CUP LAST OCTOBER.

MATADOR ONE-DAY CUP

It was a mixed Matador One Day Cup for the Tigers this season, finishing just one win outside a finals position in the 2017 competition which was once again played in Brisbane and Sydney.

Rain ruined their opening fixture against Queensland in Brisbane as the Tigers were robbed of a victory due to rain, just one run behind the DL method when the heavens opened and ended the match much to the team's frustration.

The Tigers' first win of the tournament came in game two when they faced the CA XI and defeated them by 8 wickets.

Xavier Doherty was the pick of the Tigers bowlers taking 3-34 and Tim Paine made a superb century in the run chase finishing 101 no whilst Dom Michael was also impressive making 83.

The next game saw another win for Tasmania, defeating eventual champions NSW by 15 runs.

Alex Doolan top scored with 67 whilst Simon Milenko, Hamish Kingston and Beau Webster also contributed with the bat. Cameron Boyce had a good day out with the ball taking 4-55 as the Tigers pipped the Blues by 15 runs.

Back to back losses to Victoria and Western Australia saw the Tigers finals chances dashed. However Alex Doolan was again at his best in these matches making 87no vs Bushrangers and 93 against the Warriors.



The Tigers finished their One Day campaign with a win against South Australia, Cameron Stevenson having a debut to remember taking a superb 5-32, whilst Alex Doolan was again amongst the runs making 79 as the Tigers finished their Matador Cup on a high note, defeating the Redbacks by 28 runs.

SHEFFIELD SHIELD

Despite a disappointing season on the win/loss ratio, the season saw some great individual performances and had many players taking steps forward in their first-class careers. Cameron Boyce, Simon Milenko, Cam Stevenson, Jake Hancock, Andrew Perrin and Gabe Bell all debuted this season in the Tigers Baggy Green.

At the half way mark heading into the Big Bash League break, the Tigers were still in the race for finals contention. A win against the Warriors and shared points with the Bushrangers and Blues had them still with a chance. Struggling to find the breakthrough win in the second half of the season, the Tigers bowed out in the race for the silverware.

Simon Milenko found his form as an all-rounder with a fantastic first season with the Tigers. Producing 517 runs, which included a first-class highest score of 87 against the Blues in Wollongong, he was also the highest wicket taker for Tasmania, piling up 18 wickets for the season.

Alex Doolan produced a first-class best with an unbeaten knock of 202 which helped Tasmania to secure their nine-wicket win against Western Australia. Along with the unbeaten score Doolan sustained an injury which had him sidelined until after the break.

Beau Webster continued to make his mark on first-class cricket. The youngster had the third best run haul for the Tigers including an unbeaten 122 against the Victoria at home.

James Faulkner produced his maiden first-class century, as he and Webster saved the Tigers from defeat against the Blues at the Blundstone Arena. It was the skipper, George Bailey, that led from the front this season - the third highest run scorer for the series. This included four half centuries, an unbeaten 142 against the Redbacks and an unbeaten 200 against the Blues which also brought up his 20th first-class century.

Gabe Bell, Ben McDermott and Sam Rainbird all finished the season in fantastic form, showing Tasmania what the future of cricket in the state holds.

Record crowds continued to flow through the gates at Blundstone Arena with three of the four home matches sold out. Similarly, massive TV audiences tuned in for both home and away matches for BBL|06.

But ultimately, the on-field results overall weren't consistent enough to nail down a finals berth despite some outstanding performances throughout the year.

D'Arcy Short launched himself onto the world stage in his first Big Bash match smashing 61 from 29 balls against the Sixers in Sydney. Tim Paine began his solid Big Bash campaign with 63 from 45 balls helping the Hurricanes secure victory and starting their season in the perfect fashion.

Paine continued his form with the bat against the Stars on Boxing Day scoring 91 from 61 balls and, along with the ever-reliable George Bailey who scored 74 not out, ensure the Hurricanes set a respectable total of 4-188. However, it wasn't enough to keep the Stars at bay as they chased down the total in 17.4 overs with the loss of just 3 wickets, thanks to big hitting innings from Glenn Maxwell, Rob Quiney and Luke Wright.

The big hitting continued against the Hurricanes in the next match against the Heat at the Gabba with Chris Lynn (84 from 50 balls) and Brendan McCullum (72 from 35) combining for a 109 run, second wicket stance to guide the Heat to victory.

The Hurricanes recorded one win and one loss to the Strikers in BBL|06, starting with a win in Hobart thanks to a return to form for hard-hitting newcomer, D'Arcy Short. Short clubbed 60 from 39 balls combining with Paine in a 105-run partnership to lead the Hurricanes home, chasing down the 144 in 17.2 overs. Dan Christian shone with the ball, taking 5 for 14 from his 4 overs restricting the Strikers in the first innings.

After a difficult start, Hurricanes Jon Wells (55 from 37) and Beau Webster (67 from 43) combined to drive the Hurricanes to 8-161 in the return leg in Adelaide. The Hurricanes were reeling at 5-30 before Wells and Webster came to the crease to compile a decent score. But Ben Dunk ensured the total wasn't enough scoring 79 not out from 49 balls and leading the Strikers to victory.

The Hurricanes then returned to Hobart to take on the Thunder and were handed a 6-wicket defeat despite George Bailey's 69 not out. Shane Watson was the mainstay for the Thunder with 55 from just 31 balls ensuring the Thunder comfortably chased down the 161 set by the home side.

The highest of highs came when the Hurricanes took on the Renegades at Etihad Stadium in a must-win match to keep their season alive. Set a record total of 4-222 by the home team, the Hurricanes lost a couple of early wickets before Ben McDermott and George Bailey came together at the crease and somehow managed to keep the target within reach as the Hurricanes set about creating history. The ever-reliable George Bailey crafted a knock of 59 from 42 deliveries but was overshadowed by youngster Ben McDermott who belted an incredible knock of 114 from just 52 balls, including eight 4s and nine 6s, to all but lead the Hurricanes to victory. Needing 16 runs from the final over to keep their season alive, Hurricanes' English import, Stuart Broad, scored 11 runs from 4 balls and finished the job with a single off the last ball sending the Hurricanes camp into mass celebration.

In the final match of the season, the Hurricanes needed a big win to make the final four and the Scorchers needed a big win to host a final. The Hurricanes struggled to compile a competitive score making 6-134 before the Scorchers chased down the runs in just 14 overs to secure their home final and end the Hurricanes season.

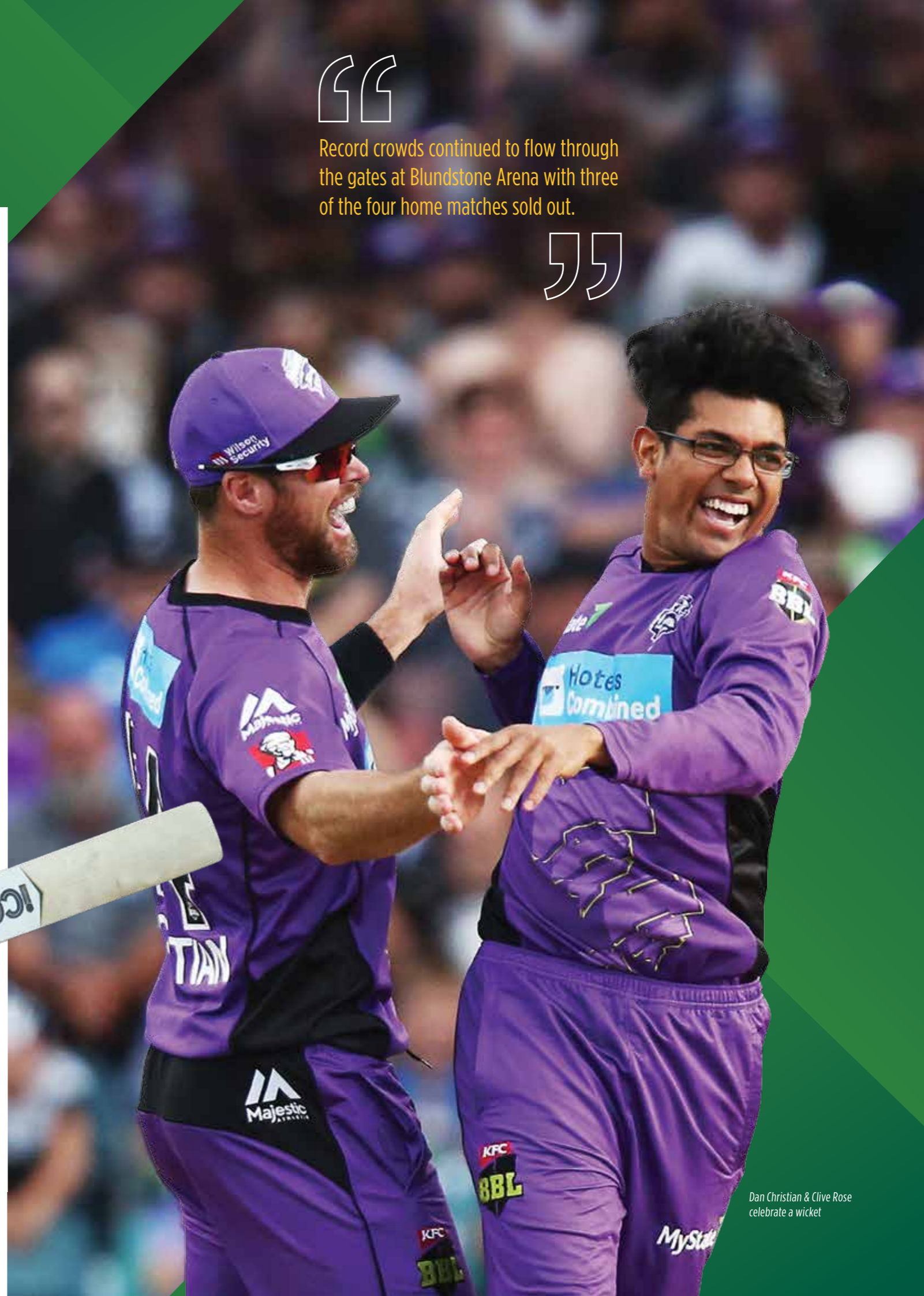

CRICKET TASMANIA PREMIER LEAGUE

2015-16 CTPL SEASON & GRAND FINAL

THE 2016-17 DETAIL FIRST CRICKET TASMANIA PREMIER LEAGUE (CTPL) FIRST GRADE COMPETITION WAS CONTESTED OVER 19 ROUNDS, WHICH INCLUDED SEVEN TWO-DAY, SEVEN ONE-DAY AND FIVE TWENTY20 ROUNDS.

For most of the season, the top four teams were a group to their own, jostling for positions come finals. Clarence and Kingborough were vying for the minor premiership and their round 17 encounter was evenly poised after day one before rain set in on day two, ending the match in a draw. The following week, Clarence trounced University, defeating the Lions outright in a day to secure the minor premiership (88 points) despite a loss in the final round to Lindisfarne. Kingborough also secured maximum points in round 18 before defeating North Hobart on first innings in the final round to secure second position (75 points). Defending premiers South Hobart Sandy Bay (SHSB) followed in third place (70 points) while North Hobart rounded out the top four (59 points). Lindisfarne (45 points), New Town (44 points), Glenorchy (16 points) and University (15 points) rounded out the CTPL First Grade ladder.

In a low scoring affair at Kangaroo Bay Oval, North Hobart won the toss and elected to bat against Clarence in the first semi-final. Cameron Stevenson struck early for Clarence removing Kyle Scrimgeour (3) and Jack White (2) to reduce North Hobart to 2/24. Luke Williams (23) was next to depart before Jake Doran and Corey Murfet set about rectifying the innings, combining for an innings high 54-run partnership, before Doran's patient stay was ended on 30 by Roos skipper Harry Allanby.

Allanby then collected the wickets of Murfet (39) and Boyce (12) as the Demons' batters continued to falter. The story of the tail is much the same as those above them, constantly coming and going before the innings finished on 166 from 79.5 overs. Allanby was the pick of the bowlers, claiming 4/34 while Stevenson finished with 3/60 from this 26 over spell.

A deep Roos batting line-up would have been confident chasing down the target although they were left with a tricky one hour period at the end of day one. Allanby (6) and Jesse Dinnie (3) were unable to see out the day leaving the Roos 2/26 overnight. Upon resumption, Ben Fraser (3/31) claimed the important wicket of Daniel Salpietro (16) without any further runs added to the overnight total. A couple of small partnerships pushed the score to 4/72 before a dramatic collapse of 5/24 sparked by Alex Pyecroft (2/31) and Boyce (3/31) all but spelled the end of the Roos season. A fighting last wicket stand pushed the score out to 137 before the innings ended, leaving the Roos 29-runs short of victory. North Hobart were 3/85 in the second innings when an unlikely victory was confirmed when Clarence conceded defeat.

In the second semi-final at Kingston Twin Ovals, Kingborough and SHSB added another thrilling encounter to their recent rivalry. Having finished the higher of the two, Kingborough

only required a draw to progress through to the Grand Final and elected to bat first. A steady start from openers Dylan Hay and Nathan Freitag put on 53 runs before Hay (24) was removed by Xavier Doherty (1/32). Harry Evans joined Freitag and the pair continued to take it slowly but Evans (9) was unable to emulate his scintillating regular season form, the first of Kyle Wisniewski's five scalps. The Knights continued to take a more than cautious approach led by Freitag who brought up his half century from 157 deliveries. Mitch Backhouse (16) and Clive Rose (21) provided partnerships of 38 and 68 respectively with Rose seeing Freitag to his second century of the season coming off 276 deliveries. Wisniewski returned and removed Rose and Freitag (101) in consecutive overs, breaking the Knights defence before striking again prior to the close of play with a fourth wicket before stumps were called with the Knights at 6/204.

Shane Holland (3) was dismissed shortly after resumption on day two leaving veteran Jason Shelton to bat with the tail. A 37 run eighth wicket partnership pushed the score to 250 but within the space of 6 runs, the innings was ended with Shelton (42) the last man out. Requiring 257 from 61 overs, it was effectively a one-day match for SHSB and with Ben Dunk at the top of the order it was all or nothing for the Sharks. Fellow opener Matt Clark (12) went early but it was little deterrent to Dunk who brought up his run a ball half century, which included including eight boundaries and one six. Dunk and Stuart Martin combined for a 108-run stand from just 106 deliveries before Cameron Wheatley finally got the break through dismissing Martin (32). Sean Willis (24) added a further 52 with Dunk who continued to pummel the Knights bowling, bringing up his century off just 96 deliveries. At 3/177 from 33 overs, SHSB were comfortably on track with several batters still to come. Harry Nichols (15) and Lachlan Fraser (3) came in and went as

the Knights started to make inroads but they were still chasing the prized wicket of Dunk.

They eventually got their man through Wheatley, with his incredible knock ending on 125 from just 132 deliveries. Following Dunk's dismissal, the Sharks required just 16 runs with four wickets in hand for an unlikely victory. Two further wickets to the Knights made for a nervous ending but Doherty (22no) helped guide the Sharks to their second consecutive Grand Final.

Played at Blundstone Arena - Bellerive, SHSB were looking to secure back-to-back premierships after the drought-breaking 2015/16 premiership while North Hobart were playing in their first grand final since their 2009/10 premiership.

The Sharks won the toss and elected to bowl and were rewarded early through the efforts of Gabe Bell who dismissed Caleb Jewell (3) and Kyle Scrimgeour (5) to have North Hobart 2/12. Jordan Silk and Jack White steadied before Bell struck again, removing an ominous looking Silk (35) just 15 minutes prior to lunch.

Jake Doran joined White and the pair batted passed lunch and through drinks in the second session, White surpassed a well deserved 50. In what was shaping as a wicket-less session for the Sharks, Bell returned and had White (62) caught in the gully by Alex Doolan. Doran reached his own half century in the 68-run partnership with Corey Murfet before Bell claimed his, and the Sharks fifth wicket trapping Murfet (32) in front with 219 runs on the board.

The Sharks let slip several chances throughout the day with no less than four catches going down. Doran who had been striking the ball cleanly all day was the beneficiary of one such chance, dropped after pulling a short ball from Hamish Kingston straight to square leg. He was unfazed and continued his crisp ball striking, raising his century with a fitting boundary.

Cameron Boyce (12) was adjudged caught behind down the leg side off the bowling of Jeremy Smith (1/71) in the 92nd over but Smith failed to complete his 19th over after aggravating an ongoing groin injury. Alex

Pyecroft (1*) cautiously saw the Demons to stumps with Doran unbeaten on 103 from 173 deliveries.

Resuming at 6/257 on day two, the Demons were looking to set a target and added 18 runs to the overnight score before Hamish Kingston bowled Alex Pyecroft (11). Wade Townsend joined centurion Jake Doran when the Sharks fielding woes returned with yet another catch put down.

The partnership looked to be the key for the Demons but was broken by Bell with a regulation edge ending Doran's innings on 123 from 238 deliveries. Robb Macmillan and Townsend frustrated the Sharks bowling attack in a stubborn yet streaky resistance that saw the Demons through to lunch at 8/325. The Sharks benefited from the break with both Macmillan (13) and Ben Fraser (0) caught at deep backward square in consecutive Kingston deliveries shortly after returning, ending the North Hobart innings on 333 from 134.2 overs. With a further wicket on day two, Bell was outstanding, finishing with figures of 6/80 from 32 overs,

Matt Clark and Ben Dunk started the chase in typically aggressive fashion, Clark sending the first ball of the innings flying with a flick off the pads into the midwicket fence. North Hobart were unable to bowl consistently in the opening overs with genuine line and length spoiled by a bad ball or two which Clark and Dunk ensured was punished accordingly. Clark was particularly fond of anything on the pads, flicking Ben Fraser for six in an identical shot to the first of the innings but Fraser got his own back when Clark (21 off 17) whipped one straight to Boyce, departing in the 7th over with the score on 43. Dunk was unrelenting with Doolan helping maintain the early pace but Dunk also failed to capitalise on the strong start, caught behind off the bowling of Pyecroft on 38. Dunk's wicket slowed the scoring considerably but Doolan and Willis were unfazed and moved the innings total to 2/106 at the tea break.

After the break, the pair continued where they had left off with Doolan passing 50 before offering the Demons a tough chance on 60 when a strong pull shot was dropped by a diving midwicket. To rub salt into the wound, the pair passed the 100-run partnership and Willis was also dropped shortly thereafter. Had the catch been taken, a new Sharks' batsman would

have been tasked with surviving a tricky stint at the crease just shy of stumps. Willis joined Doolan with a half century as the pair looked to have survived the day before one final scare with Jordan Silk having a massive appeal for a leg side caught behind turned down in the final over of the day. SHSB finished day two on 2/196 and with Doolan (79) and Willis (53) both not out at the crease, the Sharks were seemingly in the box seat requiring a further 137 runs on the final day.

Alex Doolan and Sean Willis continued to stretch what was ultimately the match defining partnership upon resumption of the final day, Doolan wasted no time in taking himself to triple figures in a repeat of his 2015/16 Grand Final efforts.

Shortly after the stand passed the 150-run mark, Pyecroft got the breakthrough for North Hobart, removing Willis (57) caught behind. The Sharks still with plenty of batting in the shed looked to be in capable hands with Doolan and George Bailey at the crease but in a single over, Ben Fraser put the Sharks on edge and brought the Demons roaring back into the game removing Bailey (15) and Doolan (116) both caught

by Kyle Scrimgeour within an hour of lunch. Harry Nichols and Xavier Doherty managed to navigate a new ball and fired up North Hobart to get the Sharks to the break at 5/300, a crucial partnership of 45.

On resumption, both Doherty and Nichols looked as they had done prior to the break, playing shots where they could but where necessary defending and leaving the ball well. That was until Nichols mistimed a pull shot to mid-on where a diving Caleb Jewell still had plenty of work to do to take a screamer and send Nichols (34) back to the sheds with a further 20 runs required.

Hamish Kingston (4no) joined Doherty and as he had done in the semi-final, the experienced Doherty (41no off 89 balls) scored the winning runs to once again steer the Sharks to victory and their second consecutive premiership.

For the Demons' bowlers, Fraser finished with 3/103 while Pyecroft (2/83) and Scrimgeour (1/38) also took wickets.

For his effort with the ball, Gabe Bell (6/80) was awarded the Roger Woolley Medal as player of the final.

The CTPL Women's Competition was contested over 14 rounds of Twenty20 cricket culminating in Semi-Finals and Grand Final.

At the end of the home and away season, the top four were the same as the 2014/15 and 2015/16 seasons although not in the same order. Clarence finished atop on 49 points with only one defeat and one draw blemishing an otherwise perfect season. In doing so, they ended North Hobart's two-year reign as minor premiers, although the Demons had only fallen to second place on 45 points. Chelsea Taylor (1/22) was the only wicket taker for the Shark while Lisa Astell (0/10) and Linsey DaCosta (0/11) were efficient from their three overs. In reply, the Sharks never really got going, losing wicket consistently and ultimately, falling 18 runs short with Taylor (16) and Beth Schiwy (14) the top scorers. The wickets were shared by Megan Murray (1/3), Megan Harper (1/8) and Katie Cole (1/11) for the Roos who advanced to their first Grand Final since they won the inaugural Women's title in 2009/10.

In the second Semi-Final, old foes North Hobart and New Town met at the TCA Ground where North Hobart won the toss and elected to bat. Erin Molnar got the early wicket of Angela Green (5), which brought Veronica Pyke to the crease. The evergreen allrounder was scoring freely, moving the score to 34 before Bernadette Doyle (7) was removed by Meg Phillips (1/17). Captain/Coach Belinda Page joined Pyke and as they have done so many times for North Hobart, the pair combined for a destructive partnership. Both brought up half centuries at an exceptional rate, putting on an even 100 runs before Page was dismissed (50 off 31 deliveries). In pursuit of quick runs, North Hobart lost the next five wickets in quick succession, including Pyke (58 off 42 deliveries) before Taylah Purton (17 not out) saw the Demons to the close of play 7/170. Molnar finished with 2/30 from four overs but it was Emma Mannix-Geeves who finished the best of the Bucks with 2/21 off three overs and two run outs.

For the Bucks to be any chance of challenging the Demons, they needed contributions from openers Phillips and Manix-Geeves. Pyke saw to it that that wouldn't happen trapping Phillips LBW on the first ball of the innings and later removing Manix-Geeves (8). Pyke claimed the top three batters and finished with 3/3 from her four overs. Hannah Short then took over with the ball and finished off the Bucks claiming 5/8 from four overs as Fran Sullivan (12) was the only batter to reach double figures. New Town finished their innings on 9/37, a far cry from their best efforts while North Hobart sent a ominous warning to fellow grand finalist Clarence in the process.

At Blundstone Arena the following weekend, North Hobart made it four premierships in a row following a comprehensive eight wicket victory over Clarence in the Detail First CTPL Women's Grand Final.

Clarence had no hesitation in electing to bat and immediately threatened to post a large total when Emma

Thompson and Erin Fazackerley started the innings in blazing fashion, posting 32 from the first six overs. In a dismissal which ultimately changed the nature of the match, Thompson (25 off 31 balls) was run out at the bowlers' end after Fazackerley punched one back down the pitch where Hannah Short got a fortuitous deflection onto the stumps.

When Fazackerley (15 off 22 balls) was also run out by Short, the Roos struggled to maintain their strong start with Demons captain Belinda Page (3/18 off 4) and Kirsten Allen (2/10 off 4) tightening the screws to restrict the Roos to 7/99 off 20 overs.

EMERSON RODWELL AND KIM FAZACKERLEY MEDAL PRESENTATION DINNER

Harry Evans and Erin Fazackerley claimed the Emerson Rodwell and Kim Fazackerley Medals for Season 2016/17 respectively.

In just his second season in Tasmania, Kingborough captain Harry Evans capped off a superb season by winning the 2016-17 Emerson Rodwell Medal. Evans became just the 15th player in the competition's 151 year history to score 1000 runs in a season scoring 1081 runs at 72.07 through the regular season which included three half centuries and five centuries across 19 matches.

With one round to go, Evans and Clarence captain Harry Allanby were joint leaders with 15 votes but a polished knocked off 62 against North Hobart helped seal two votes to finish as the outright winner. Jake Hancock, who in the final round scored an impressive 92 against Glenorchy, finished on 16 votes, just one vote behind Evans in second place while Allanby finished in third place with 15 votes.

Evans' hot form started in Round 6 where he scored 142no against New Town then in the following round, 126 against Lindisfarne. From Round 11, Evans purple patch continued, posting 54, 40, 116, 58, 109, 154 and 86.

Furthermore, Evans also became just the sixth player in CTPL history to score five First Grade centuries in a season, joining Ken Burn (1899-00), James Atkinson (1927-28), Ron Morrisby (1940-41), Keith Bradshaw (1988-89) and more recently, Travis Birt (2002-03).

Chasing 100 runs for victory, Olivia McDonald (2/23 off 4 overs) claimed two wickets in the first over to have North Hobart reeling at 2/2 but an unbeaten 100 run partnership between Veronica Pyke (64no off 48 balls) and Hannah Short (26 off 33 balls) helped the Demons chase the total in just 14 overs to claim their fourth consecutive CTPL Women's premiership

For her exceptional efforts with the bat, Veronica Pyke was named the Player of the Final for the second time in her career.

In the Women's competition, a dream season for Erin Fazackerley was dutifully rewarded, winning the Kim Fazackerley Medal.

After securing a Hobart Hurricanes contract for WBBL|02, the Clarence product had an exceptional season in the CTPL Women's competition, winning the aggregate batting award through the regular season, and taking her total through finals to 506 runs at 46.00 as well as claiming 7 scalps at 22.29.

The niece of Tasmania's first female Test Cricketer Kim Fazackerley, after whom the medal is named, Erin scored her maiden CTPL Women's century this season, blasting 135no against Lindisfarne to help charge to 22 votes, a clear six votes to her nearest rival in Meg Phillips (16 votes), while fellow teammate Emma Thompson finished in third place on 15 votes.

"From a personal point of view I am extremely proud of Erin and to present it to her was quite humbling. She has worked hard at her game over the past 12 months and has been rewarded with great performances and opportunities" Kim Fazackerley said.

At just 18 years of age, Fazackerley is the youngest player to receive the award and the first from Clarence to be crowned the Kim Fazackerley Medallist in the competition's eight-year history.

CTPL TEAMS OF THE YEAR

Becoming just the 15th player in the competition's 151-year history to score 1000 runs in a season, Harry Evans headlines the Men's 2016-17 CTPL Team of the Year.

Also, having the honour of being selected as captain, Evans notched 1176 runs at 69.2 after finals, which included three 50's and a joint-competition record five centuries in a season, including a high score of 153 against a full strength SHSB. Evans' run haul is the third best ever recorded and just 31 runs shy of the competition record.

New Town's Jake Hancock was also prolific with the bat, blasting 844 runs at 84.40 at the top of the order to help the Bucks claim their first taste of silverware in 44 years following their successful run in the CTPL Twenty20 competition. Joining Hancock at the top of the order is North Hobart's young gun Caleb Jewell who had a consistent season, scoring 602 runs at 33.44 including six half-centuries.

Harry Nichols had a breakout season and deservedly claimed his first Team of the Year selection. Nichols came of age this season with his innings to notch his first CTPL First Grade Century at Kangaroo Bay Oval. Taking 129 wickets for the season between them, 2009-10 Rodwell Medallist Andrew Kealy, Tom Briscoe and Alex Pyecroft were selected as the quick bowlers, while Clarence captain Harry Allanby was also awarded for an excellent season with the ball, in the side as a spinner. Clarence coach Daniel Salpietro was named Coach of the Year while Muhammad Qureshi and Jamie Mitchell were also recognised as Umpires of the Year.

Kingborough DCC are the only club outside the top four represented in the Women's 2016/17 CTPL Team of the Year with the experienced Emily Divin named captain and opening batter alongside Kim Fazackerley Medallist Erin Fazackerley. Divin is joined by teammate Elizabeth Bain for the first time after having taken 13 wickets at 12.92 throughout the season.

Minor premiers Clarence were the best represented with the aforementioned Fazackerley joined by all-rounder Olivia McDonald, first time representative Natalie Pearce and Leesa Walker as coach of the year. SHSB also have three players acknowledged in Irish international Isobel Joyce as well as Linsey DaCosta and Beth Schiwy who have both been honoured previously.

North Hobart's tireless duo Belinda Page and Veronica Pyke were selected with their exceptional all-round records. Pyke averaging 75.25 and 5.00 with bat and ball respectively while Page managed 29.50 with the bat and 13.31 with the ball.

Rounding out the team; New Town CC representatives Meg Phillips, who claimed the batting averages award with an average of 112.33, and wicket keeper Emma Mannix-Geeves. Manix-Geeves also taking the gloves for the team after an exceptional first full year in the competition.

CTPL TWENTY20 COMPETITION

The CTPL Twenty20 Competition kicked off the 2016/17 season with Saturday/Sunday double headers at Lindisfarne Oval and Kingston Twin Ovals. The competition then adjourned until December to allow the Hobart Hurricanes players to join CTPL clubs in readiness for the BBL.

Clarence went through the competition undefeated to secure their place in the final with club favourite Jon Wells in scintillating form upon his return to his junior club with scores of 55no, 89no and 75 in the final three rounds of the competition. After annihilating Kingborough the previous round, New Town secured their place in the Grand Final (its first in 28 seasons) after downing University by 8 wickets.

At Blundstone Arena—Bellerive, New Town Cricket Club lifted their first piece of silverware in 44 years following an exhilarating three run victory over Clarence. The match ebbed and flowed throughout the night and fittingly ended in spectacular fashion when New Town wicket-keeper Brad Loveluck sealed the win with a fantastic backhanded run-out.

Earlier, the Roos were quickly made to regret their decision to send the Bucks into bat after winning the toss, New Hobart Hurricanes recruit D'Arcy Short blasted 52 off 25 balls to lift the team to 75 off just 8 overs before he was sensationally caught on the boundary at deep square-leg.

Fellow opener Jake Hancock (72no off 51 balls) batted through the innings to see New Town to 7/165 with Sam

Rainbird (3/36) and Fletcher Seymour (2/20) the multiple wicket takers for the Roos.

In reply, Dan Christian (2/33) removed James Seymour (0) with the first ball of the Clarence innings, as well as danger man Jon Wells (8) in the first three overs to have Clarence reeling at 2/9.

With their backs against the wall, Daniel Salpietro (72) and some explosive hitting from Wade Irvine (28) and Cameron Stevenson (25) got the Roos innings back on track and heading into the final over, nine wickets down with only nine runs required.

When Salpietro dispatched Luke Shelton for a boundary, just four runs were required with four balls to go. Advancing down the wicket, Salpietro lost sight of the ball after miss-hitting it. Wicket-keeper Loveluck swooped on the ball flicking it onto the stumps, as Salpietro desperately dived back to his crease to no avail.

The win was the Bucks first Premiership since 1970/71 when then captain Brian Eade lifted the CTPL First Grade trophy following a draw against Clarence.

D'Arcy Short was named Player of the Match after dominating the match with his 52 as well as bagging 3/24 off 4 overs.

KOOKABURRA CUP (ONE-DAY) COMPETITION

The Kookaburra Cup competition was contested over seven rounds spread throughout the season. At the conclusion of the seven rounds, Kingborough and Clarence claimed positions in the final with five wins a piece, Kingborough the minor premiers courtesy of an additional seven bonus points with Clarence collecting four bonus points.

Played at Blundstone Arena – Bellerive, Clarence inflicted yet another Grand Final defeat upon Kingborough with a strong all-round performance securing a 6-wicket victory. Roos captain Harry Allanby led from the front, scoring a brilliant 104 off 132 balls and shared a defining 170-run partnership with Michael Jones (96no off 103 balls) to help guide the Roos to victory with 10 balls to spare.

Earlier in the day, Kingborough won the toss and had no hesitation in electing to bat. Jason Shelton (34 off 31) set the pace early to help the Knights to 45 before he was adjudged LBW off spinner Daniel Salpietro. Fellow opener Nathan Freitag was joined at the crease by Beau Webster the pair combined for a 50-run stand but with runs drying up for Freitag (37 off 74 balls), he tried to increase the run rate and was undone by Allanby with the score on 95.

In the form of his short CTPL career, Harry Evans (86 off 84 balls) came to the crease and continued his dominance on the competition, scoring another half-century as well as reaching the 1000 run mark for the season and along with Beau Webster (67 off 86 balls) helped set the Knights up to a competitive 8/261 off 50 overs. Salpietro was best with the ball for the Roos, claiming 4/53 off his 10 overs while Sam Rainbird (1/38), Allanby (1/41) and Cameron Stevenson (1/70) also collected wickets.

The Knights started well with the ball removing Roos danger men Salpietro (18 off 22 balls) and Liam Devlin (5 off 20 balls) early in the innings. Michael Jones joined Allanby and the pair continued the scoring, albeit at a slower than required pace. Continuing to fall behind the required rate and with both having brought up their half centuries, they attempted to lift the run rate. Allanby passed triple figures before being dismissed with 25 runs required while Jones scored his final 46 runs from 31 deliveries and saw the Roos home with Cameron Stevenson (13* off 9 deliveries).

For his efforts with the bat, Allanby was awarded the Danny Buckingham Medal. The win was the Roos seventh Kookaburra Cup (One-Day) title and their first since 2011/12.

UNDER 18 VACATION COMPETITION

The CTPL Under 18 Vacation Competition was once again contested in January in two pools of four teams over the course of three rounds, with the first and second place team in each pool headed to the Semi-Finals. In the Semi-Finals, University proved to be too strong for Lindisfarne while Clarence edged out North Hobart by three wickets.

On Grand Final day, Clarence won their third consecutive CTPL U/18 Vacation Competition Premiership following a convincing 40-run win over University of Tasmania at Kangaroo Bay Oval. After winning the toss and batting first, Clarence were on the back foot early, losing opener Jack Fagan for no score but a match-defining partnership of 76 between captain Liam Devlin and Caiden Workman (33 off 49 balls) steadied the ship and helped the score to 84 before Devlin departed for 58 off just 50 deliveries.

Following the wicket of Devlin, the Roos lost 8/48 to eventually be all out for 132 in the 37th over, with Lachie Clifford (2/9), Nathan Duggan (2/16) and Jack Cornish (2/33) all claiming multiple wickets for the Lions.

The Lions got off to a great start and were on top early in the run chase at 2/66 but Clarence fought their way back into the game through Devlin (2/21) and Workman (2/29) who combined with the ball to remove the top four Lions batters. Adrian Butterworth then put the Lions to the sword claiming 3/15 off 7.1 overs. The tail was wrapped up in quick succession securing the 40 run win for the Roos inside 31 overs. Clarence Captain Liam Devlin was adjudged the Player of the Final for the second consecutive season following his impressive all-round effort.

CTPL OVER 40S COMPETITION

The inaugural CTPL Over 40s competition kicked off this season with six of the eight CTPL clubs contesting the competition over four rounds (and a final).

Club legends such as Andrew Dykes, Mark Colegrave and Roger Woolley (Clarence), Tim Scott and Gerard Denton (Kingborough), Michael Farrell and Adam Polkinghorne (SHSB), Dan Marsh and Michael Di Venuto (North Hobart) as well as Scott Keeling (New Town) were all welcomed back to clubland to contest in the inaugural season.

North Hobart's leading run scorer Todd Pinnington topped the batting aggregate with 101 runs at an average of 50.50 while Andrew Towns took the most wickets in the competition with 10 dismissals.

After four rounds, SHSB (16 points) and Kingborough (12) topped the table and qualified for the final, while North Hobart (8), Clarence (8), New Town (4) and Glenorchy (0) rounded out the ladder.

Played at Queenborough Oval on Sunday 19 February, Kingborough were crowned CTPL Over 40s Premiers following a resounding 41 run victory over minor premiers SHSB.

Chasing 149 runs for victory, former Tasmanian Tigers fast bowling duo Denton and Damien Wright tore through the top order, leaving the Sharks reeling at 3/6.

Despite a mini revival from five time Rodwell Medallist Adam Polkinghorne (37no) and Andrew Downton (32) the Sharks were eventually dismissed for 107 in the 16th over.

Earlier in the match, the Knights won the toss and elected to bat with Denton (48no), Jarrod Williams (24), Marc Owen (20) and Tim Scott (17) all providing handy contributions with the bat to help post 9/148 off their 20 overs.

After winning back-to-back title for the Knights in 1996-97 and 1997-98, Denton said it was great to come back to where it all began.

"The Over 40s competition is a fantastic concept, where you can play with and against all those you had fierce battles with and rekindle great friendships you had in the past"

"Without a doubt (the competition) will continue to grow and we (Kingborough) are very much looking forward to competing once again next season and hopefully defending the title" Denton said.

CTPL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

REGINALD HAWSON - CAREER 1896/97 TO 1914/15

Reg Hawson's career commenced with Derwent in the 1896/97 season at just 16 years of age. A right-hand opening batsman, he became one of the best batsman in the state in the period prior to the Great War.

After the introduction of district cricket Hawson also played with North Hobart and New Town, winning five premierships including two as captain whilst with North Hobart.

Across a twenty-season career, Hawson played 135 matches scoring 7,039 runs at the healthy average of 51.01, with a highest score of 230 in 1902/03. Hawson had the leading batting average or aggregate on eight occasions in the early 1900s, and also claimed 105 wickets with the ball.

Hawson represented Tasmania in 27 First-Class matches.

BRIAN RICHARDSON - CAREER 1951/52 TO 1975/76

Brian Richardson enjoyed a long and distinguished career representing North Hobart (63 games), Kingborough (102), University (40) and Glenorchy (64) across 24 seasons. The youngest from one of the most significant families in Tasmanian Cricket history, the right-hand batsman played 269 games, scoring 9,612 runs at 35.21.

Richardson's most prolific season was with Kingborough in 1968/69, scoring 1001 runs at 66.73 including a career high score of 181* against North Hobart, as a result leading the competition batting averages and aggregate that season. Richardson was also a useful bowler claiming 306 wickets at 18.50.

Team success came for Richardson at each end

of his career, winning a Premiership with North Hobart in 1953/54, and another with Glenorchy in 1973/74 when captain scoring 77 opening the batting in the Final.

IAN BEVEN - CAREER 1975/76 TO 1988/89 & 1998/99

Ian "Snowy" Beven was the competition's most decorated player during the 1980s. A tall left-hand predominantly opening batsman and right-arm off-spin bowler, Beven enjoyed much team and individual success.

Beven debuted with Clarence late in the 1975/76 season as a 17 year-old, with the all-rounder quickly becoming a regular member of the side until the 1988/89 season, before returning for a final season ten years later.

Individually Beven won the Medal as the Association's best player four times in 1984-85, 1985-86, 1986-87 and 1988-89. Beven also won twelve averages and aggregate awards during the 1980s, and was player of the final in Clarence's 1982/83 triumph over Glenorchy taking 5/32 and scoring 83.

Beven was a key member of Clarence's successful teams of the era, playing six premierships from eight successive Grand Finals from 1981/82 to 1988/89, including four in a row from 1981/82 to 1984/85, plus was a member of five one-day titles.

Beven also represented Tasmania and Scotland.

CRICKET TASMANIA STATEWIDE T20 COMPETITIONS

MEN'S STATEWIDE TWENTY20 COMPETITION

Fifteen teams from across all of Tasmania featured in the eighth instalment of Cricket Tasmania's Statewide Twenty20 Competition. Through knock-out format, the teams dwindled until New Town (CTPL) and Burnie Hurricanes (CNW) met in the Grand Final at Blundstone Arena - Bellerive.

Batting first against Burnie, New Town lost the dangerous Jon Tattersall (10) and Luke Shelton (17) early as Burnie looked to be on top. Tawanda Mupariwa (10) followed immediately after Shelton before Brad Loveluck (26) and Joe Randall (38no) steadied the innings with a 36-run stand partnership. Late contributions from Nathan Wegman (19 off 12) and Kris Denby (12no off 11) helped steer the Bucks to a competitive total of 5/139 off their 20 overs. Four of the five bowlers used by Burnie collected wickets with Thomas Lewis, the only multiple wicket taker collecting 2/35 from his four overs. Shaun Redman was the most economical with 1/18 from his four overs.

Chasing 140 runs for victory, the Burnie Hurricanes looked in total control at 0/65 but the introduction of off-spinner Matthew Dyson (2/18) as the fifth bowler claimed the important wickets of opening pair Nick Revell (27 off 25 balls) and Aydan Costelloe (41 off 33 balls) to help swing the momentum back in the Bucks' favour.

After the success of Dyson, Jon Tattersall was also introduced and further restricted the Hurricanes with economical bowling claiming two wickets. As the required run rate steadily increased, Burnie continued to lose wickets at important stages of their chase and eventually fell 23 runs shy of victory. Burnie struggled to handle the speed of Ryan Lees who closed out the innings with 1/17 from his four overs.

For his composed and crucial innings with the bat, Randall was named the Dene Hills Medallist as player of the Final.

WOMEN'S STATE FINAL

Following their victory in the CTPL T20 Grand Final the previous day, North Hobart backed up and defeated South Launceston by eight wickets in the Women's State Final.

The 2016/17 grand Final was a repeat of the thrilling 2015/16 Grand Final where North Hobart secured a one wicket victory. North Hobart's Veronica Pyke was once again brilliant with both bat and ball, firstly claiming 2/5 off 4 overs and then scoring an unbeaten 42 to help seal the Demons' fourth consecutive State T20 Premiership.

Batting first, South Launceston managed 5/89 led by Belinda Wegman (27) and Courtney Webb (24) at the top of the order with Kirsten Allen also proving economical with the ball for the Demons finishing with 2/19 from 4 overs.

The Demons lost both openers early but as they had done the day prior in the CTPL Twenty20 Grand Final, they steadied, this time through experienced duo Pyke and Belinda Page (40no from 31 balls).

Captain Page said to win both the CTPL and Statewide T20 premierships over the past four seasons has been a remarkable achievement and added that the team consisted of six players who had played in all eight finals.

"Having a group of players in the squad for so long brings the best out of our youngsters coming in from year to year" Page said.

To cap off a fantastic weekend, Pyke was named the Player of the Final for the second time in as many days for her efforts with both bat and ball.

GAME AND MARKET DEVELOPMENT

THE GAME & MARKET DEVELOPMENT TEAM AT CRICKET TASMANIA IS COMMITTED TO THE STRATEGIC GOAL FOR CRICKET TO BE TASMANIA'S FAVOURITE SPORT AND A SPORT FOR ALL TASMANIANS.

To achieve this, it is critical the game continues to thrive at grass roots level, engaging the whole community and providing opportunities for the next generation of players and fans.

The Game & Market Development department is focussed on delivering high quality experiences for all Tasmanians, with the aim of linking participants to a variety of playing options whilst encouraging progress along the pathway.

NATIONAL REVISED JUNIOR FORMATS PILOT

During the 2016-17 season the Tasmanian junior cricket competitions played a key role in a National Revised Junior Formats Pilot program. The program involved revised formats for Under 14 and below club competitions aimed at increasing activity, reducing time and developing players' skills faster. The results of the pilot were outstanding and feedback and revisions from Tasmanian junior clubs and co-ordinators have been provided to help mould the further roll out of these formats nationally.

The results of the revised formats were overwhelmingly positive with wides and no balls contributing 35% less to the overall score and 43%

more balls being hit. This significantly reduced down time, shortening overall game time and increasing the rate of development of all players. There were 58% more balls bowled on a good length and with more balls in play this also meant more balls being hit by the batter, significantly more runs scored, more wickets taken and more activity for fielders. Overall, the revised formats provided for more fun, more action in less time developing better skills which is a pretty good combination for developing cricketers.

A SPORT FOR ALL - COMMUNITY CRICKET AWARDS

Tasmanian clubs, associations and initiatives were nominated as finalists in 5 of 11 categories at the A Sport for All - Community Cricket Awards. Attending a gala presentation evening at the MCG, Tasmania emerged with two winners (Geoff Jackson Snr and the Hurricanes Primary League) recognising the tireless work of thousands of volunteers across Tasmanian and Australian Cricket.

the opportunity to engage in the game in the style of the Big Bash League. Boys and girls in grade 3-6 take part in small-sided action-packed games where the ball is always in play and every player has their moment in the spotlight.

This program continues to grow with 7,000 students taking part. The program begins with a participation phase, where students of various cricketing experience have a go at the format. Each school can then enter a team in the regional finals with the opportunity to play for a spot in the State final, which is played at Blundstone Arena. The winners in the boys' and girls' divisions can win their way to the national finals day at the MCG in December.

From across Tasmania, eight boys' teams and eight girls' teams competed in the state-wide final and an action-packed day resulted in Lauderdale Primary School (boys) and Corpus Christi PS (girls) from Bellerive winning their way through to the national finals. This was replicated for year 7/8 high

school girls where St Mary's College emerged victorious.

This season saw an increased focus on cricket participation in schools. This resulted in a significant increase of student participation in MILO in2CRICKET skills programs. This program is a 4-week curriculum aligned unit of cricket designed to encourage and assist Health and Physical Education teachers to deliver cricket during the school year. The activities outlined in the MILO in2CRICKET skills program are game-based, highly engaging and specifically designed to improve students' abilities across all cricketing disciplines. This year over 8,000 students participated in a MILO in2CRICKET skills program.

The school-based program also provided an excellent link to community T20 Blast centres with students encouraged to join their local centre and play T20 Blast matches in a club environment. The program provides an ideal match format for developing cricketers and combined with the "skill zone", it allows young

players the time and space to develop their skills in preparation for junior club cricket. The T20 Blast program was delivered at 28 centres around the state and provides an ideal bridging and development program between MILO in2CRICKET and junior club cricket combined with the fun, excitement, sounds and family friendly timeframes of the Big Bash League. To further highlight their experience at each Hurricanes home game - selected players from the T20 Blast program were involved in the Next Gen program on field at the start of each innings, receiving a signed hat from one of the BBL stars.

GROWING CRICKET FOR GIRLS - FUNDING AND NEW COMPETITIONS

Australian Cricket launched a significant strategic funding program in August 2016 with grants available for associations, clubs and schools to develop girls cricket competitions. Tasmanian competitions were quick to

get on board with new junior girls' club competitions developed in Hobart, Launceston and the North-West coast and a new school based competition in Launceston.

The two-year funding provided helped establish these competitions and will support the ongoing growth and development of playing opportunities for girls across the pathway. There is now at least one underage girls' competition in each region servicing girls emerging from T20 Blast programs and developing their skills before progressing through to senior cricket. We will be working closely with clubs to drive the ongoing development of the playing pathway to ensure girls have every opportunity to play and enjoy cricket and pursue the game to their full potential.

In Tasmania in the 2016-17 season, the Growing Cricket for Girls Fund supported:

- » 4 associations
- » 16 clubs
- » 7 schools
- » 33 new teams

Alongside club competition development the Junior SATIS schools developed a Primary School Girls competition in recognition of the increased interest from their students in participating in cricket competitions.

FACILITIES

The National Facilities Audit was completed this season in Tasmania with 193 sites across the state audited to assess clubrooms, changerooms, grounds/pitches, training nets and other amenities. This process now provides Cricket Tasmania with the

data which will form the basis of an evidence-based facility strategy providing the foundations for short, medium and long-term facility planning for Tasmanian cricket's ongoing growth and development.

The National Community Facilities Funding Scheme, with support from Cricket Tasmania's grass roots funding program, saw support provided for a range of community facility developments targeted at facilitating participation growth. The program engages funding from Cricket Australia, Cricket Tasmania and other supporting partners such as local and state governments to ensure community facilities can meet the demand of ongoing participation growth. This season, projects were funded at the Ulverstone District Cricket Club, North Hobart Cricket Club, Launceston Grammar Church School, Scottsdale High School, North Huon Cricket Club, and the Kingborough and Glenorchy councils (for turf ground upgrades and development).

Overall, 43,003 Tasmanians participated in cricket programs during the 2016-17 season representing growth of 12% for the year. This included over 26% growth in female participation (including 37% growth of female club cricket participation) and included growth across all age groups and formats of the game.

KIDS

THE CAPTAIN'S CHALLENGE:

- » This fundamental motor skills program aligns directly with the school curriculum and gives classroom teachers the opportunity

to develop basic ball skills in a fun engaging program indoors or out whether it is rain, hail or shine. Over 6,000 children participated in the program this year.

MILO IN2CRICKET PROGRAM

- » Over 75 volunteer coordinators from different clubs, schools and communities committed themselves to deliver a MILO in2CRICKET program, ensuring over 2,000 Tasmanian youngsters had a great first experience in the game. The program focusses on fun and developing a skill base through games in preparation for further engagement through the excitement of T20 Blast matches.
- » Over 200 MILO in2CRICKET participants had the opportunity to get involved in the Test Match, participating in the lunchtime activities and meeting some of the players at a pre-match clinic.

MILO T20 BLAST

- » The MILO T20 Blast program continues to be a significant step in the Junior Cricket Pathway. The number of centres grew around the state from 20 - 28 showing the support and value the Tasmanian cricket community sees in this program. Over 1,000 kids aged 7-11 took part in the program, getting the opportunity to be their own Big Bash League Star on their local oval with their friends.
- » New centres were established in areas such as Sorell, Brighton, Wynyard and Circular Head increasing the footprint of the program and giving a greater number of kids the opportunity to

get involved with fast, fun formats of cricket.

SCHOOL COMPETITIONS

- » The SATIS cricket competition engaged the MyCricket administration program for the first time, allowing players performances to be included into their overall career statistics. This competition has helped nurture the development of players such as George Bailey and James Faulkner in the past and will no doubt continue to play a role in developing players of the future. In time, we will be able to track these players back to their formative years in the schools' competitions.
- » School-based competitions are co-ordinated by various school sport bodies and encompass a diverse range of game formats and opportunities with over 2,500 players involved.
- » A new girls high school competition run by SATIS started up in Hobart with 12 teams competing and the NHSSA started a girls' competition with 7 teams.
- » The National MILO T20 Blast Schools Cup finals at the MCG saw teams represent their school and state on one of the world's greatest sporting stages.
- » Lauderdale Primary School 5/6 Boys - finished 3rd overall on the day.
- » Corpus Christi - Year 5/6 Girls - finished 5th overall on the day.
- » St Mary's College - Year 7/8 Girls finished 2nd with all teams representing the state with pride and enthusiasm, making the most of their time on the hallowed turf of the MCG.
- » The Primary Schools Finals day was a huge hit with schools from across the state enjoying their time competing on Blundstone Arena.

MILO IN2CRICKET SCHOOL AMBASSADORS PROGRAM

- » The School Ambassador Program continues to serve as a strong link to introduce kids across the state to cricket. This year saw over 210 schools across the state engage with the program.
- » The School Ambassadors were

invited and recognised at a function at Blundstone Arena during the Hurricanes match with the Melbourne Stars on the 21st of January.

- » Justin Brasnja from Corpus Christi Catholic School was recognised as the MILO in2CRICKET School Ambassador of the year for his tireless work promoting the game at his school.

SCHOOL PROGRAM

- » Game Development staff conduct coaching clinics and visits to schools across the state and this season completed visits bringing cricket to over 20,000 children.
- » The school visit program also included visits to numerous country areas as part of the preparation of teams competing in the Statewide Country Challenge program.
- » The school visits were highlighted by the hardest working member of the Cricket Tasmania team - Captain Hurricane, whose appearances were always greeted with rapturous applause of the potential future Hurricanes.

COMMUNITY

INDIGENOUS CRICKET & NATIONAL INDIGENOUS CRICKET CHAMPIONSHIPS (NICC)

- » After many years of service to Tasmanian cricket - Garry Maynard stepped aside from his role as Co-Chairman of the Tasmania Indigenous Cricket Advisory Committee. Garry has provided advice and enthusiasm for our Indigenous Cricket programs throughout his tenure. He didn't leave a vacuum upon his departure, playing a key role in recruiting Paul Harriss to the committee to further develop Indigenous cricket programs in Tasmania.
- » The Lord's Taverners again joined with Cricket Tasmania this season to support and promote the NICC team. Through this support and promotion Cricket Tasmania was able to identify further eligible players from around the state and showcase the opportunities this program provides.
- » This included Cricket Tasmania supporting Taylor Wigg and Cara

Watkins to participate in the Women's NICC in the Victorian team.

- » The NICC was again staged in Alice Springs and Tasmania's team coached by Paul Collins and Guy Grey and captained by Callan Morse represented the state with pride and enthusiasm.
- » The team's highlight was defeating eventual champions Victoria under lights at Treagar Park.
- » Rhys Ward was rewarded by his peers for a consistent all round

performance at the NICC as the team's Most Valuable Player.

- » Rhys Ward was also awarded a Baggy Black Cap for his performances during the week-long tournament.
- » Thank you to Merinda Sainty for her Welcome to Country ceremony prior to the Test Match at Blundstone Arena and all home BBL fixtures

CRICKET TASMANIA PROVIDES A VARIETY OF PROGRAMS TO PROMOTE THE SPORT FOR ALL ABILITIES AS TRULY A "SPORT FOR ALL".

- » With the support of the New Horizons organisation, Tasmania fielded its first ever Intellectual Disability team in the National Inclusion Cricket Championships in Geelong in January.
- » This opportunity provided a great platform for some talented players to showcase their skills on a national stage. With some great performances at the Championships, Tasmanian Vice Captain Justin Nilon has been selected to represent Australia in the UK in a tri-series against England and South Africa.
- » Working with Mosaic Support Services, a cricket program has been set-up to engage people with disabilities to enjoy our sport through ongoing sessions. This program will be looking to link with a local club in 2017-18 to integrate into club environments.
- » The Cricket Tasmania Club Development program also encourages clubs to pursue inclusive practices and ensure their clubs can cater for the vast majority of cricketers with a disability who are already integrated into the mainstream.

- » Tasmanian Roar Assistant Coach, David Drew, also travelled to India during February to coach the Australian Blind Cricket Team in the Blind World Cup as part of cricket's ongoing drive to be A Sport for All Australians.

INDOOR CRICKET - "BEASTWEAR" NATIONAL INDOOR CRICKET LEAGUE

- » Two Tasmanian Indoor Cricket Centres (Eastern Shore and High Performance Cricket Tasmania at Kingborough) have launched a total of 4 teams to compete in the "Beastwear" National Indoor Cricket League.
- » These teams will be competing across 9 rounds of matches starting in May and running through to August, with the winning team competing in a National finals event in September.

INTER CULTURAL SPORTS LEAGUE (ICSL)

- » A committed band of volunteers headed by the indefatigable Raj Chopra have developed the Intercultural Sports League to bring local communities from diverse backgrounds together for the love of sport.
- » With assistance from Cricket Tasmania, the group formed a 6 team T20 cricket competition with players and local teams from Hobart, the IC Crusaders (made up of players from Indian and Bangladeshi backgrounds), Pak Eagles (Pakistanis) and the Tasmanian Punjabi Society.
- » The competition in its inaugural season was won by the IC Crusaders. The competition is looking to expand next season and with support from federal and state governments the competition aims to further celebrate and develop inclusion and diversity through sport.

CLUBS

CLUB CRICKET

Junior Club Cricket

- » The National Revised Formats Pilot Program was delivered

in three junior competitions around Tasmania for U14 and below competitions.

- » The Revised formats were an overwhelming success with more fun, more action, less time and better skills development for all players involved.
- » 3,500 underage club cricketers are the future of the game in Tasmania with players competing across multiple formats and age groups providing the transition and skill development environment crucial in nurturing our young players through to senior cricket.
- » T20 Blast program was further embedded into the junior pathway with players making the transition from MILO in2CRICKET towards junior club cricket.

Senior Club Cricket

- » The Club Development program - "A Sport for All" workshops were held around Tasmania. Attending clubs were provided with support. Ideas and strategies for creating more inclusive environments and increasing their engagement with their local community.
- » Over 7,500 senior cricketers compete in regular club competitions around the state across a range of two-day, 50 over and T20 formats
- » All associations and clubs rely on countless hours of volunteer work to deliver their programs from one season to the next. The Cricket Tasmania Volunteer Recognition program seeks to empower clubs with further opportunities to recognise this valuable resource for Tasmanian cricket.
- » Further volunteer and club support is provided across competitions through areas such as coach and umpiring education, club development, facility developments, administrative support and assistance with grants.

COACH DEVELOPMENT

Coaches are catalysts that can enhance the quality of a player's participation and enjoyment of the sport and

foster their ongoing success. To this end Cricket Tasmania conducts a variety of coach accreditation courses and upskill seminars and club visits in each region of the state.

Community Coaching Courses

- » Conducted during the pre-season and in each region, 103 coaches attended the Community Coaching Course (Level 1). The course aims to equip coaches with a range of skills and ideas for training and match day management to maximise the participation and skill development of young cricketers.
- » Currently Tasmanian cricket is supported by over 1600 accredited coaches with over 90% of these coaches

accredited at Introductory or Community Coach level.

- » This equates to 1 coach for every 25 participants in the state.

Coach Development

- » Over the course of the season Cricket Tasmania delivered coach development programs for Community and Representative coaches.
- » This included hosting a Representative Coaching Course in August with 16 candidates participating in the program.
- » The Club Coaching Scheme was delivered across 20 clubs state-wide providing a regular communication, planning and development channel to support the coaches working across these competitions.
- » Coach upskill sessions were provided state-wide to support the rollout of the National Junior Formats Pilot including match coding and representative trials as part of the pilot.

This activity was supported by regular visits to club training sessions around the state to support the tireless work of volunteer coaches working across all age groups and abilities and in a range of challenging environments.

Sam was appointed to the Cricket Australia International Panel, and debuted as an International Umpire in the T20 clash between Australia and Sri Lanka at Kardinia Park, Geelong on 19 February 2017. Sam also travelled to India in November 2016 for the Cricket Australia Umpire Exchange Program, officiating in 2 Ranji Trophy matches. Sam was awarded his seventh consecutive Tasmanian Umpire of the Year and combines his Umpiring career with his secondary school teaching role at The Hutchins School in Hobart.

Mike has had a busy season with Cricket Australia National Umpire Panel appointments in Sheffield Shield, Matador Cup and BBL, as well as three 4th Umpire appointments for the T20 International Series, Australia v Sri Lanka. YOUTH PATHWAY

Jarrod Freeman was rewarded for his outstanding performances across the 8 matches with selection in the Australian under 17 team. A fantastic result for Jarrod and our Pathway program.

The Under 19 team fell to a similar fate after playing outstanding cricket in the 5 round games, recording 3 wins to finish 3rd in our Pool. Fletcher Seymour demolished the WA batting order in the preliminary final recording figures of 5 wickets for 8 runs off 9 overs. Tasmania eventually dismissed 17 runs short of our target with 16 balls remaining in the blistering heat. A disappointing result but it gave staff a glimpse of the fight and determination shown by our team. Liam Devlin with 307 runs at an average of 42 the best of our batting unit while Fletcher Seymour took 14 wickets at an average of 19. Mac Wright with consistent performances across the 8 match was selected in the Team of the Championship.

The introduction of the Under 13 team in to the National Championships has been a great experience. This will expose our most talented young players to National level cricket and provide a foundation for years to come as they progress in to the under 15 Tasmanian Team. Our boys recorded two wins during the week which was a fantastic result and an amazing opportunity to experience cricket interstate.

Our Under 15 team had the most difficult week of all as Queensland turned the weather on with a huge cyclone that disrupted the tournament. Our team didn't record a win during the week but again had an amazing opportunity to taste cricket at a higher level against larger states. The experience gained from staying away from home in a team environment will only enhance our performances moving forward. Sam O'Mahony was the best performer with 10 wickets and spinner Will Collins was selected as the emergency for the Australian Under 16 team. A fantastic result for Will and Cricket Tasmania.

DEVELOPMENT TOUR

A key strategic objective of Cricket Tasmania is to produce the best players and coaches in Australia and seeking this outcome was the motivation behind us undertaking a tour of England during June and July.

A squad of 13 emerging players involved in our Youth Pathway and Tigers High Performance programs were chosen for the trip. The tour itinerary had the squad playing a mixture of match formats with T20, 50 overs per side and 60 overs per side (red ball) matches scheduled at Campbell Park in Milton Keynes and Ageas Bowl complex in Hampshire which is the home of the Hampshire County Cricket Club.

Whilst the squad experience mixed results (2 wins, 3 losses and 2 draws) during the tour, they were presented with the opportunity to train at first-class facilities and test their skills against a range of high-class and experienced players during

matches in excellent but varied conditions.

A key component of our High Performance Pathway is match experience or 'Game Sense' and we believe there is no better way to accelerate the learning process than providing players with the opportunity to compete against talented and often older and more experienced players on a regular basis.

Key attributes sought from players during the tour were the capacity to display fight in the contest, adapt to the pitch conditions and match situation, remain confident under pressure, and take practice into play by trusting their skills in the on-field contest. We believe all these attributes are key in the development of first-class cricketers and consistent with messaging provided to players throughout our High Performance pathway.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

With Billymo Rist starting as the New High Performance Player Development Manager with Cricket Tasmania at the beginning of the Matador Cup, a number of changes have been made to the Player Development Program.

Billymo has come from St Kilda Football Club and has spent the 2016-17 season building authentic relationships with players and coaches within the High Performance program.

This has included working closely with the youth pathway through to the elite Tiger, Roar and Hurricanes Programs.

The notable program that was implemented within player development space in 2016-17 was the High Performance Professional Development Program. This saw all Coaching and High Performance staff given the opportunity to visit a number of different High Performance Organisations around the country to exchange information about best practice.

These organisations included St Kilda Football Club, Brisbane Lions Football Club, The Australian Institute of Sport, GWS Giants Football Club to name a few. This program has aimed to provide professional insight to Cricket Tasmania's High Performance program whilst role modelling the importance of professional development for all players involved in Cricket Tasmania programs.

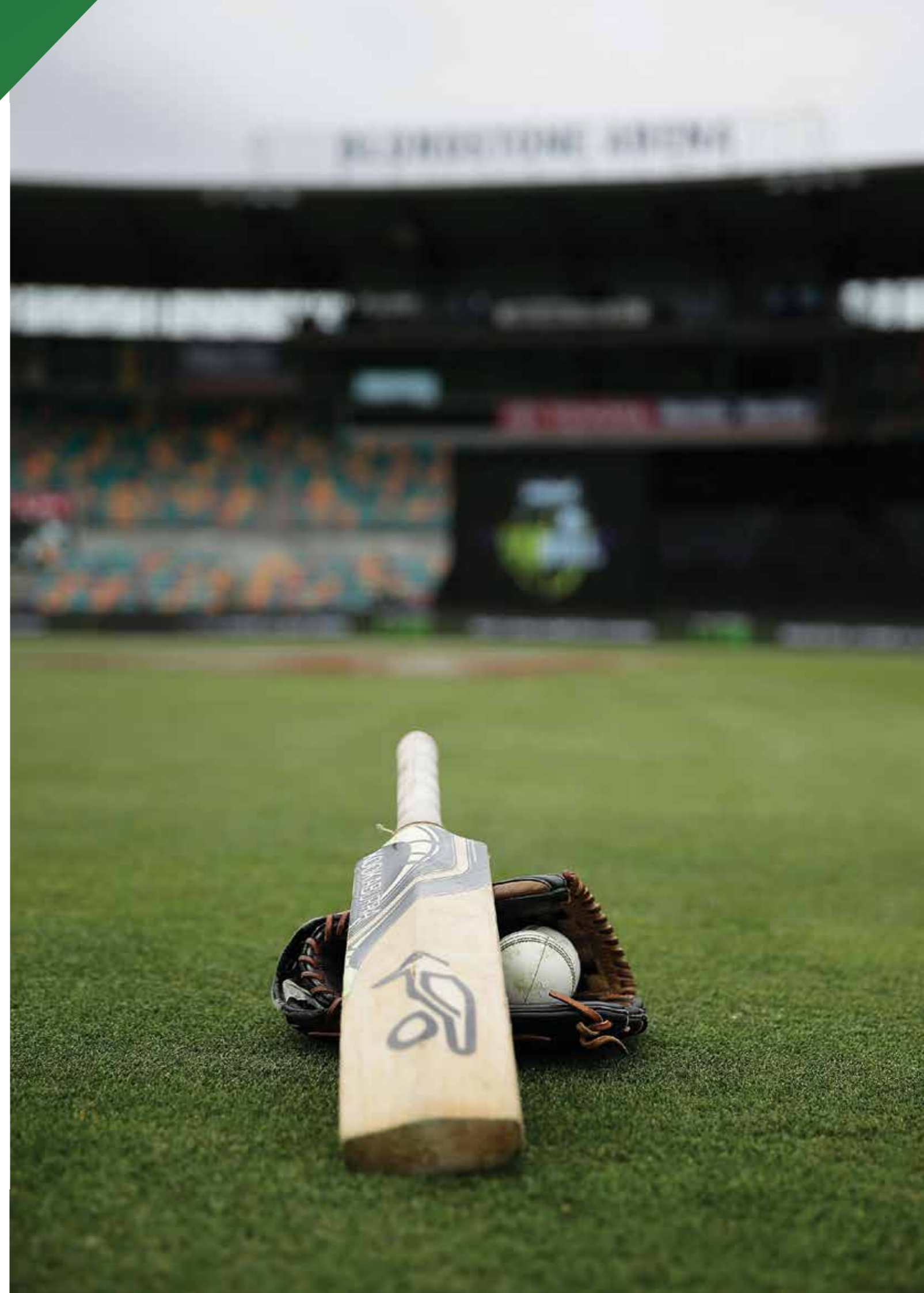
